Gee's questionable merit

News that Ohio State's President Ted Carter plans to install Gordon Gee into a new position within the Salmon P. Chase Center is an object lesson in why that center is so problematic.

Recall that Gee's legacy includes the recent evisceration of West Virginia University, where budget cuts in the wake of his unrealistic growth predictions led to elimination of entire majors, termination of faculty, and a vote of no confidence by the faculty assembly.

Given these credentials, it's unclear what service Gee will bring to Ohio State, which he left in disgrace in 2013.

Then again, the Chase Center was never about improving higher education.

From inception, the center has been a thinly veiled attempt to inject far-right

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viewpoints into academia. In a time of dwindling state support for education, the center was created by the legislature (over the objection of Ohio State's Faculty Senate), at a cost of \$5 million per fiscal year for three years and with long-term costs projected to be even higher.

Its tenure-track faculty appointments were purposefully created to exist outside of normal hiring procedures.

Its director, Lee Strang, is a constitutional "originalist" and a Christian Nationalist who fought to keep abortion rights out of the Ohio Constitution and authored an amicus brief in support of outlawing abortion rights.

This is the context in which "intellectual diversity" and the Chase Center should be understood. It is sadly consistent with Ohio State's proactive cancellation of diversity initiatives and Carter's embrace of an anti-education agenda that has festered for years in right-wing circles.

Although Carter has vowed to make hiring decisions based on merit, his actions suggest that he's in on the ruse.
